
2011 Washington Poll

A Closer Look at Attitudes
Towards Same-Sex Marriage

About the Poll

The Washington Poll is a non-partisan, academic survey research project implemented by the Center for Survey Research at the UW, a research center in the Department of Political Science. Dr. Matt Barreto, Associate Professor of Political Science is the principal investigator of this survey, and Dr. Christopher Parker, Associate Professor of Political Science is the director of the Center for Survey Research.

The survey was administered by telephone, using live callers, based on a randomly selected list of phone numbers using a publicly available list of registered voters. Voter registration status is confirmed by all respondents. Telephone numbers are merged in and verified by a third party vendor, and include both landlines and cell phones. The survey was in the field from October 10 – 30, 2011, and averaged 28 minutes in length. A total of 938 registered voters throughout the state of Washington were interviewed, yielding a 3.2% margin of error. Margin of error is larger for subsamples, or split sample components. Percentages may not add up to 100% due to rounding. Full questionnaire can be found on the Washington Poll website.

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Same Sex Marriage

Next year the legislature could pass a law allowing gay and lesbian couples to get married. If that happens, there could be a referendum in which voters would be asked to approve or reject the law. If such a referendum were held today:

Would you vote YES -- that is, to keep a law in place allowing gay and lesbian couples to marry OR would you vote NO, against the law -- to make it so that gay and lesbian couples could not marry?

Yes – keep law in place – strongly	47%	>	55%
Yes – keep the law in place – not strong	8%		
No – against the law – not strong	7%	>	38%

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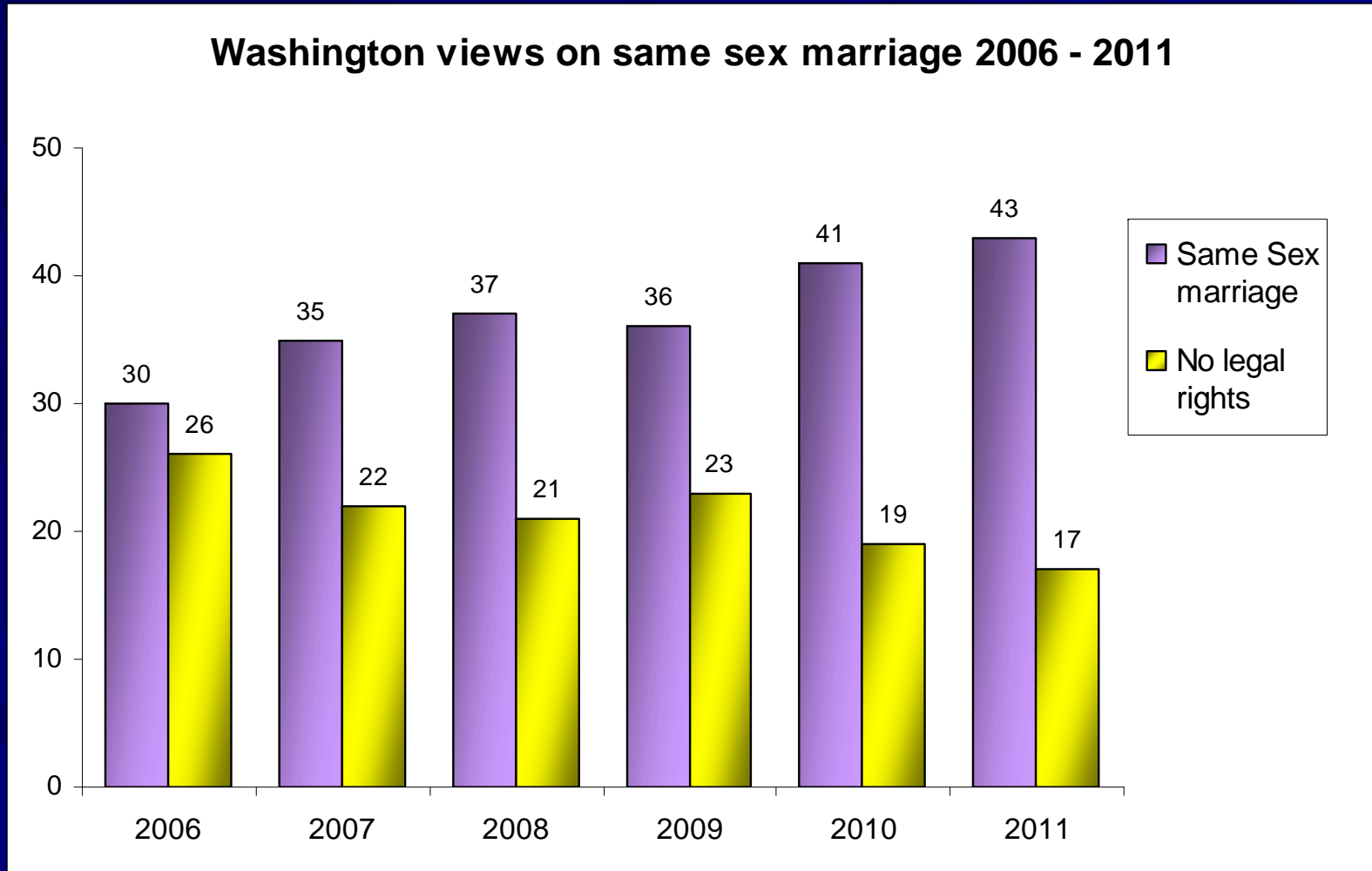
